
Worth Valley Primary School Focuses on Mental Health and Wellbeing

Throughout the half-hour session pupils gave it their all as they took part in a host of activities.

Mr Stott added: "At the heart of this is the fact that our children deserved this opportunity to virtually meet Joe.

"A lot of our children and families are really struggling with the impact of Covid, but they did all that they could to support Children in Need. They took part in activities, raised what money they could and really got into the spirit of things."



Headteacher of the Year

Mick McKenna was named Headteacher of the Year during an online awards ceremony earlier this term.

Mr McKenna, who was Headteacher at Reevy Hill Primary until he moved to Tyldesley Primary School in the summer, was almost bombarded by his family on camera as he was about to accept his award at the Telegraph and Argus Education Awards.

Before then, Reevy Hill had received a mixture of Inadequate and Requires Improvement ratings from Ofsted and two Satisfactory inspections under the old rating system.

Then in its latest visit, in October 2019, it was deemed to be Good, with Mr McKenna being recognised for the impact he had.
