WORLD BOOK DAY 2023



Arguably the biggest event in every school's calendar - World Book Day - was celebrated in style this year across the Leading Learners family.

At Worth Valley Primary School pupils were invited to come to school dressed as their favourite book characters. Each class also planned different book-based activities, including Key Stage 2 pupils pairing up with younger children to read and enjoy stories.

All 450 children at Tyldesley Primary School, plus staff, celebrated World Book Day 2023 dressed as crayons. The whole school based their learning for the day on the themes of the book 'The Day the Crayons Quit' by Drew Daywalt, ultimately discovering that with everyone's unique strengths and talents, we are stronger and can achieve more together than we can apart.

Children at Woodside Academy created their favourite book and film characters using hard boiled eggs, for a chance to win a voucher to use at the school's travelling book fair. Winning creations included depictions of Roald Dahl's Charlie and the Chocolate Factory, Finding Nemo and Minions. Pupils were also treated to stories read over the school tannoy, so that all children could enjoy a range of book genres read by different adults.

While some pupils at Reevy Hill Primary School went to the Alhambra Theatre in Bradford, as part of the Bradford Literature Festival's celebration of World Book Day. Lenny Henry, MC Grammar and various authors all read stories and children were treated to a free book each. Other pupils enjoyed practical activities such as baking recipes from well-known stories and early years children had a tea party where they retold the wellknown tale of The Tiger Who Came To Tea using puppets.

"Across our schools, we celebrate reading each and every day, but it is fantastic to do something extra-special for World Book Day.

"Reading helps to develop and hone language and literacy skills, aiding self-expression, creativity and imagination. It also helps to build empathy and understanding for others, broadening perspectives, as well as developing critical thinking and analytical skills.

Most of the class have already achieved bronze badge status. This includes at least six children on silver and even some on gold. Some dedicated readers are also aiming high and aspiring to achieve their reading ambassador awards.

FLAT STAN FIRST AID WORKSHOPS

Year 5 and 6 pupils at Tyldesley Primary School learned some vital lifesaving lessons after taking part in Flat Stan First Aid training.

The children learned about caring for cuts, bruises and burns, as well as how to perform CPR and raising the alarm in the event of serious injury. Janet Shorrock, Acting Headteacher, said: "Accidents can happen anywhere, at any time, and having basic first aid knowledge means that children can think fast and help out in the event of an emergency. These are life skills in every sense of the word, and we were proud of how well our pupils took on board these valuable lessons."

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STEPPING BACK IN TIME

Year 4 pupils at Woodside Academy have travelled back in time for a Roman Day in school, dressing up in costume and acting like Roman citizens, gladiators and gods.

The children investigated and explored artefacts from the period, finding out more about what each item was made from and what it would have been used for. Playtime involved games that Roman children would have played and modern maths and English was replaced by learning to write using the Roman alphabet and numerals.

Pupils even wrote a birthday invitation, as an example of an everyday communication that would have been written by average citizens during the time.

A highlight of the day for everyone was an investigation into Roman battle armour, with children constructing their own shields, learning battle strategies as well as finding out facts about life in the Roman army.

Kirsty Porter, Headteacher, said:

"It is fair to say that Roman Day was a total hit! The children really immersed themselves in the themes of the day, taking in so much knowledge and showing great enthusiasm for history."



GETTING BACK TO NATURE

Pupils across Reevy Hill Primary School are exploring the natural world in a popular after school Nature Club and weekend Forest School.

The Nature Club and Forest School provide an opportunity for children to learn about nature in a hands-on way, developing practical skills and learning to work as a team outdoors. Baking potatoes over an open fire, learning bushcraft skills and looking after the wildlife in the local area are all activities recently enjoyed by attendees. **Gary Stott, Headteacher, said:** "Wider curriculum opportunities are very important to us at Reevy Hill, and we are delighted that Nature Club is so popular with our pupils.

"Research has shown the positive impact of time spent in nature on children's well-being and academic performance, and it's highly enjoyable for everyone involved. The children are incredibly proud of the things they learn and do during their time outdoors and it's wonderful to see how it helps to foster self-confidence and resilience within them."

MAP READING RECCE

Year 6 pupils at Worth Valley Primary School visited the Yorkshire Dales National Park this term to develop their map reading skills and learn complex gridreferencing.

Despite the chilly conditions, pupils battled the elements and had a fabulous time exploring the beautiful surroundings. **Ceinwen Lodge, Headteacher, said:** "Map reading and complex gridreferencing are important life skills that can be valuable in a range of situations, from outdoor activities like hiking and camping, to further practical applications like navigation and logistics.

"Our Year 6 pupils had a great day wandering around the Yorkshire Dales practising these skills."

Tyldesley Primary School has hosted two exciting Easter themed competitions to give the children the opportunity to get creative at home and share their work in school.

EYFS & Key Stage One children were invited to create their very own Easter bonnets for a special Easter bonnet parade.

While Key Stage 2 children were tasked with decorating an egg, with no set theme it was a chance to think outside the box and design something magnificent.

Janet Shorrock, Acting Headteacher, said:

"As you can imagine, there were so many wonderfully imaginative creations, featuring an Easter bunny or two and taking lots of inspiration from symbols of the spring."

The largest children's choir in the world, Young Voices, had its numbers increased even further with the addition of 'The Woodside Choir', made up of children from Years 4, 5 and 6 at Woodside Academy.

The Woodside Choir helped to raise the roof during an incredible concert held at Sheffield Utilia Arena, where five thousand pupils from schools from around the UK joined together in song in front of an audience of over 13 thousand people. **Kirsty Porter, Headteacher, said:** "The event was a wonderful opportunity for our children to perform. The atmosphere was amazing and everyone had a fantastic time with some children even saying it was the best night of their life!
